Why study Health and Social Care at The Sixth Form at Ridgewood?

- Studying Health and Social Care Level 3 National Extended Diploma will account for a full-time study programme for students who are intending to go onto further study in a related sector (equivalent to 3 A-Levels).
- It is for students who are interested in learning about health and social care and are keen to work within a specific Health and Social Care sector.
- The qualification supports access to a range of higher education courses around and within the Health and Social sector.

What topics will I study in this subject and how will they be assessed?

Topic	What this means
Unit 1 – Human Lifespan Development	External assessment written exam, 1 hours 30 minutes. Learners cover physical, intellectual, emotional and social development across the human lifespan, and the factors affecting development and the effects of ageing.
Unit 5 – Meeting Individual Care and Support Needs	Internal assessment coursework. Learners focus on the principles and practicalities that underpin meeting individuals' care and support needs, which are the foundation of all the care disciplines.
Unit 3- Anatomy and Physiology for Health and Social Care	External assessment written exam, 1 hours 30 minutes. Learners cover the structure, organisation and function of the human body, and anatomical and physiological systems and medical research related to disorders affecting these systems.
Unit 4 – Enquiries into current research in Health and Social Care	This unit is assessed under supervised conditions. Part A is released four weeks before Part B and the time is scheduled for students to carry out and compile notes on their secondary research. Part B is an external three hour exam where students take in their Part A research task to support. Learners explore the methodologies of contemporary research and investigate the implications for health and social care practice and services
Unit 6 – Work Experience in Health and Social Care	Internal assessment coursework with a work placement. Learners explore the benefits of work experience. They carry out and reflect on a period of work experience, and plan for personal and professional development.

What skills will I need in this subject?

Analysis	Your lessons and independent study work will involve analysis. This

Research skills	As part of your coursework you will be expected to use research skills to investigate different areas of health and social care. You will be
	presented with areas to research, use a variety of sources, and justify their relevance.

What will my lessons involve?



- We will discuss key terminology and identify areas that you must independently research.
- In theory lessons you will listen to key information about a topic area and create sets of notes to support your coursework or revision for the exam.
- You will conduct independent research using a variety of sources including internetbased health and social care resources, reports, statistical data and websites and the wealth of health and social care books and guides we have available in the Sixth Form.
- A large proportion of lessons will be spent completing coursework in controlled assessment conditions. Some of this time will be spent researching a variety of sources as well as completing extended writing tasks and practical application of skills.
- Some lessons will involve listening to specialist speakers.

What will my independent study involve?

- In order to gain the highest grades in the exam you must complete at least 1 hour of independent study for every lesson. During these sessions you are expected to produce revision resources that will prepare you for the exams.
- In class you will have identified your gaps in knowledge so it will be clear which areas you need to work on. Examples of this are creating mind maps, creating revision flash cards and self-quizzing.
- You may also have to complete work collaboratively such as completing a group presentation on a given area of the exam.
- For coursework, your independent study will involve research and exploration of areas related to the content and scenarios presented in the assignment brief.

How do I know this is the right course for me?

- You will be a strong independent learner who can analyse written and numerical information accurately.
- You will relish the challenges of researching, conducting and analysing data.
- You will enjoy working collaboratively and prefer a combination of coursework and exam. One of the challenges is time management as there are lots of deadlines and managing both coursework and exam content at the same time can be difficult. It is important that you plan from the very beginning of the course your independent study time in school and at home so that you have a clear plan of when you will complete work. You will also have lessons with the students completing the extended certificate only and will be studying more than one unit at a time. This can be confusing so a well organised folder and timetable is essential from the start of the course.
- This course is ideal for students who wish to go into a career in the caring profession or pursuing a career in health and social care sector.
