What topics will I study in this subject?

Topic	What this means
Education	You will study the role and function of the education system and the differences in attainment across groups of individuals such as different ethnicities, genders and social classes.
Families and Households	You will explore the changing patterns of marriage, cohabitation, separation, divorce, childbearing, including the sociology of personal life, and the diversity of contemporary family and household structures.
Theory and Methods	You will look at the theoretical, practical and ethical considerations influencing the choice of topic, choice of methods to be used in sociology research and how to conduct research effectively.
Crime and Deviance	You will explore the distribution of crime and deviance by ethnicity, gender and social class, including recent patterns and trends in crime.
Beliefs in Society	You will study religious organisations, including cults, sects, denominations, churches and New Age movements, and their relationship to religious and spiritual belief and practice.

What skills will I need in this subject?

Skill	What this skill involves in this subject
AO1 Demonstrate knowledge and understanding	You need to show that you can learn about and retain knowledge of sociological theories, concepts and evidence, as well as sociological research methods.
AO2 Application	Apply sociological theories, concepts, evidence and research methods to a range of issues.
AO3 Analyse and evaluate	Analyse and evaluate sociological theories, concepts, evidence and research methods in order to present arguments, make judgements and draw conclusions.

What will my lessons involve?

- For exam-based lessons you will learn a range of theories using textbooks and information provided by the teacher, as well as a number of online activities specifically designed around course content.
- Learn about and evaluate a number of case studies in sociological research as well as those reported by the media.
- Use your own knowledge and discussions with peers to construct short and long answers to questions about the topics and cases you have researched.
- There will be a requirement for you to complete much of your work outside of lessons both before, in preparation for lessons and after, as follow-up consolidation of academic work.

What will my independent study involve?

- Flipped learning (reading materials in preparation for your lesson)
- Essay plans and revision resources
- Quizlet (creating your own testing materials for self-assessment)
- Exam questions (self-marked using mark-schemes to familiarise yourself with examiner requirements)

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Assessment	Details of assessment
Paper 1: Education with methods in context	Assessment is a two hour written exam worth 80 marks. Questions include: Education: short answer and extended writing, 50 marks. Methods in Context: extended writing, 20 marks. Theory and Methods: extended writing, 10 marks.
Paper 2: Topics in Sociology	Assessment is a two hour written exam worth 80 marks. Questions include: Section A: extended writing, 40 marks. Section B: extended writing, 40 marks.
Paper 3: Crime and Deviance with Theory and Methods	Assessment is a two hour written exam worth 80 marks. Questions include: Crime and Deviance: short answer and extended writing, 50 marks. Theory and Methods: extended writing, 30 marks.

How do I know this is the right course for me?

- You will be required to spend a minimum of six hours per week studying outside of lessons to be successful in completing the Sociology course.
- This course will suit students who are well organised, enjoy reading, and are proficient in essay writing skills.
